Speech & Language Milestones

12-24 months



By age 2, most children have about 50 words and begin using two-word phrases like "more juice." If your child isn't doing this, it might be worth consulting a speech-language pathologist.

- 12-15 months
 - Demonstrates use of objects (e.g., brushes teeth, feeds others).
 - Shakes head "no."
 - Says 8-10 words spontaneously.
 - Follows 1-step directions during play.
 - Points to 2 action words in pictures.
 - Understands a few prepositions (in, on).
 - Makes 3 animal sounds.
 - 15-18 months
 - Plays independently.
 - Hands a toy to an adult for help.
 - Asks "What's that?"
 - Follows directions for 2 objects (e.g., "Get __ & __").
 - Identifies objects by category (e.g., food, animal,
 - clothes).
 - Says 15 words meaningfully.
 - 18-21 months
 - Uses two turns during conversation.
 - Indicates when pants are wet.
 - Leads caregiver to desired object.
 - Plays with a group of toys (e.g., farm animals).
 - Engages in pretend play (e.g., animals eating, caring
 - for baby).
 - Uses single words frequently.
 - Repeats a few phrases (e.g., "What's that?").
 - 21-24 months
 - Chooses 1 object from a group of 5.
 - Uses 50 different words.
 - Puts toys away on request.
 - Follows a 2-step related direction.
 - *By 24 months, the average vocabulary is 50-300 words. 50 words by age 2 is the milestone. Meaning, we become concerned if we don't see at least 50 words.

What to do:

If under 3, you can and are encouraged to inquire about early intervention services in your area (SoonerStart).

Contact pediatrician to discuss milestones and referral to a Speech-Language Pathologist for a comprehensive evaluation.

Ensure your child has a hearing test, as hearing loss can impact speech and language development. Ear infections and non-infected fluid build up in the ear should also be considered.

Encourage communication at home through interactive play, reading together, and using gestures and signs if verbal skills are limited.
